OOPS!

A family in Coventry, England, are "quite mortified" after calling the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals in September to rescue a lizard peeking from underneath a bed in their home. But when officer Vic Hurr arrived at the home, she discovered the "lizard" was not a "lizard at all, it was a pink stripy sock." "I think the family eventually saw the funny side," an RSPCA spokeswoman told the Independent. "The sock had obviously been there quite a while. It was a typical teenager's bedroom, I suppose."

The Caving Club at Indiana University explored Sullivan Cave in southern Indiana on Sept. 17, but when they headed back to campus, they forgot one thing: a 19-year-old freshman physics major who had become separated from the group and was trapped behind a locked gate. When the club president realized two days later that a caver had been left behind, members rushed back to save him. "You could tell they were pretty shaken up," the caver told the Indiana Daily Student. "They did near kill me." The student reported he licked moisture off the cave walls during the ordeal and wrote goodbye letters to his family on his iPhone until the battery died.

MOTHER OF THE YEAR

Ebony Woody, 34, of Columbus, Ohio, was nothing if not thorough on the morning of Sept. 18 when, following an argument with her daughter, she purposely drove her car onto the sidewalk and struck the 17-year-old, who was walking to school, according to Columbus police. After knocking the girl down and running over her leg, Woody stopped and backed up, driving over the leg a second time. QFM96 reported Woody generously gave the girl a ride to her father's house, where she dropped her off without reporting the incident. Woody later turned herself in at police headquarters and faces charges of felonious assault, aggravated vehicular assault and endangering children. The daughter was treated for two fractures to her left leg.

ANIMALS ON THE LAM

Auburn, Massachusetts, police received a number of calls over the weekend of Sept. 15-17 about a wayward goat, but it wasn't until the wee hours of Monday, Sept. 18, that No. 448 was finally corralled at the La Quinta Inn in Auburn, reported CBS Boston. The "mischievous runaway farm animal" was seen on surveillance video entering the lobby of the hotel and wandering the halls. Peter Blash, No. 448's owner, said the goat jumped a 5-foot-high fence and "took off like a criminal." However, Blash said, "I had one that made it all the way to Sturbridge."

QUESTIONABLE **IUDGMENT**

Coolidge, Arizona, resident Victor Pratt boasts that he's played with snakes his whole life. So when a rattlesnake slithered by during a family party at a nearby lake on Sept. 7, Pratt grabbed the venemous member of the viper family and s

howed the kids "how to catch it and I was playing with it like little kids do. I wasn't thinking. I was showing off," he admitted to FOX 10 News. The rattler apparently didn't want to play along and bit Pratt on his face and neck. Pratt's sons quickly drove him to a nearby emergency room, from which he was later airlifted to Banner-University Medical Center Phoenix, where Dr. Steven Curry treated him for the bites. "There is a 100 percent chance he would have died if he'd not made it to the hospital within minutes," Curry noted of the severity of the victim's injuries. Pratt remained unconscious for several days. He told reporters he had learned his lesson and would not play with rattlesnakes again.

BRIGHT IDEAS

Kevin Michael Cook, 24, of New Castle, Pennsylvania, was too drunk to drive on Sept. 3, so he enlisted the help of an 8-year-old girl. WPXI News reports the girl told Darlington Township police that Cook, a family friend, ordered her into a car at her grandmother's house and forced her to drive him toward East Palestine, Ohio. The car stopped after nearly wrecking twice, as bystanders called 911. Police gave Cook a sobriety test, but he was too impaired to finish it. He was charged with endangering the welfare of a child, driving under the influence and driving without a license.

orror sub-genres seem to go in and out of vogue every decade or so. But zombie fiction appears to have endured like no other. It's easy to see why.

Cannibalistic undead humans shambling through the ruins of civilized society can be terrifying metaphors for a number of things that terrify us about ourselves: mindless consumerism, blind lust, drug addiction. The cause of a given work's zombie epidemic can also serve as the author's way of warning us about the possible consequences of disregarding the environment or failing to invest in, say, researching its root cause and potential antidote.

Some zombies are comically slow and easy to control or dispense with (Shaun of the Dead). Some are fast and zombify not from a virus, but from fungus like cordyceps (The Girl With all the Gifts, The Last of Us), a strain of which happens to turn ants who come across it into rage zombies IRL(!). But all offer us a way to place ourselves within a milieu in which the protagonists navigate a dystopian hellscape in which most humans — some of whom they knew and loved — have turned into ghastly monsters that want to chew on their innards. And often, it's the survivors who end up being the real monsters.

Of course, actually being plunged into an alternate reality where water, food, gas and other basics are scarce and highways are clogged - as many of us were last month as Hurricane Irma approached — is not fun at all, especially for those who weren't able to prepare.

So in honor of this year's Horror Issue, we offer a zombie apocalypse survival guide. Because you never know. (Okay, hordes of people rising from the dead to feast on the living is probably not going to happen. But most of these things are probably a good idea anyway.)

Here are some practical tips to help you and your loved ones survive the undead onslaught.

Cardio

Whether they are fast zombies or slow zombies, we'd like to repeat key advice we heard at the beginning of *Zombieland*. Get on that treadmill as often as you can. Fuel will be scarce and there will be zombies and probably

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
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The Inedibles

CL's restaurant critic recalls past treats that felt like tricks.

n more than five years of writing food colamns for CL, I still get excited as I enter a new restaurant. There's usually something positive to report, and sometimes I discover a dish that's truly thrilling. In fact, it's really rare to encounter an item that's flat-out horrible. I've found Bay area chefs and restaurants work hard to please their clientele.

But, there are occasions when things go awry. That's why for this year's Horror Issue, we're revisiting The Inedibles.

I've left out names or identifying details to protect the guilty although several have gone out of business — because I'm not here to pour even gourmet sea salt in the wounds. Each week I endeavor honestly to report my experience. I look for balance while I hope for surprise. As chef Thomas Keller, of French Laundry and Per Se fame, once said in a TED Talk, "cooking = ingredients + execution." It's no urban legend that attention to detail and freshness are half the battle.

What if no one cares, though? I've only given a single one-star review, and it remains the nadir of my critical experience. Almost everything we were served — including a sangria so medicinal we had to return it - made us question whether there was any guidance in the kitchen or any concern on the part of the owners. The wait staff didn't help - relaxed, yes, but also distracted and untrained. The bottom-line issue: The restaurant had no idea of what it was trying to be.

In other restaurant encounters, I've run into single dishes that turn the whole meal into a misadventure.

At times, the issue is one of unpleasant texture — like an all-too-memorable tomato bisque, so thick and cheesy I felt like "a first grader with a paste fetish."

Or there are off flavors that never should've left the kitchen, like the Caesar salad that tasted "like old fish, not anchovies, and not in a good way."

And speaking of seafood, sometimes you run into not-so-fresh fish that tastes like it came from the periodic table of elements, not the sea: like the sushi that tasted "mushy

instead of firm, with a metallic aftertaste in place of ocean brine." In short, inedible.

I still remember the shock on my tongue from a beautiful-looking dish with sour dressing that was well

> on its way to becoming the base for a fruity beer: "The roasted peach and prosciutto salad is a nice idea, but the raspberry vinaigrette is bitter and tastes slightly fermented."

And there was the unfortunate cassoulet in which the white beans were soggy and the kitchen seemed to have had way too much thyme on its hands. The dish was so woefully over-seasoned that we couldn't believe anyone in the restaurant had tasted it before it left the kitchen.

Every once in a while, a serving piece provides an unwelcome surprise — like a plate with not very strategically placed dips, so that before I noticed "a flowing stream of water has snaked its way from the lovely sculptural plate off the table and onto my seat cushion to create a startling lake between my legs."

Oh. mv.

Other times, you wonder what a chef was thinking in the creation of a new dish: "The dense, rubbery dessert that tastes of sugary artificial fruit infusion is only made worse by a garnish of breakfast cereal that most palates eschew by the time they're old enough to read."

What about a schizophrenic offering where perfection meets disaster?

"The thick, cracklingly crisp crust is as perfect as any crème brûlée I can remember.

That's why the Tahitian vanilla bean custard underneath is so maddeningly disappointing; it has zero flavor. The custard is creamy enough, but it is neither sweet nor vanilla. I kept going back to the wonderful glass-like topping, only to return to the custard thinking that surely I must be mistaken. Sadly, it seems that the sugar and vanilla bean ran off and got hitched in another dessert."

I just wanted to cry.

When a restaurant gets sloppy in storing its food, unwanted flavors may appear, too.

"As it turns out, the layers of thinly sliced potatoes bathed in cream are perfectly tender. Sadly, they taste funky, as though they were made ahead and not stored properly."

Luckily, the horrors of dishes that look like dog food (a phrase that never saw print) or taste of freezer burn are hard to come by. The same is true for metallic fish and fermented salads.

More often, dining out is not as capricious as asking, "Trick or treat?" 3

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I want candy

Beers that taste just as good as your favorite Halloween confections.

raft beer and candy might seem like a Co., is reminiscent of a Reese's cup, for example, strange match at first. But brewers near and far have been making these two opposites attract for quite some time. In fact, Norasha-Nya Burton, general manager at Centro Ybor's Brass Tap, says curating a flight of beers from her a way that you can eliminate the candy. That's draft list that mirrors the experience of downing your favorite Halloween confections with a complementary brew — minus the extra calories — is a breeze.

"I'm giving the guests a trip down candy lane where the beer industry is taking us — where I can give you the mental image that you're eating this specific candy or that specific candy," Burton told CL. "I could do a flight pairing right now, and you could be eating an Almond Joy, Reese's, Smarties and a Tootsie Pop just from four different beers."

As Burton puts it, these adventurous creations that push the envelope - which aren't necessarily candy-inspired, but do trigger a similar, complex flavor profile — are where beer is headed. While they might not've been around five or so years ago, the industry has evolved in such a way that beer lovers can essentially eliminate the candy part of the suds-meet-candy pairing.

Sweet Baby Jesus!, a chocolate peanut butter porter from Baltimore-based DuClaw Brewing

while an MIA Beer Company fruited Berliner Weisse, Encanto De Amor, conjures Sour Patch

"I love that we can manipulate beer in such sort of where I stand on it. Not that I don't think

that they can be paired, but the experience through beer should be how we mimic real life. And we're accomplishing that so well right now that you almost don't need to have a pairing," Burton said.

So, if you were thinking about marrying candy and beer to ring in the upcoming holiday, here's a roundup of s'more brews that taste just as good as the real thing. Think of it as, like, adult trick-or-treating. Or something.

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

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
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

Unlocking horror

An escape room for spirits.

or two years, guests at the Vault of Souls have had the chance to explore every nook and cranny as they wandered the rooms, looking for clues and learning the stories and subplots contained in the Vault. If you missed something the first year, you had a chance to delve deeper the second. Not so this year: The organizers have completely revamped the storyline - and how you navigate it.

The delightfully talented Scott Swenson and his staff of creatives have taken the soul of the Vault of Souls - an almost claustrophobic sense of psychological terror — and morphed it into something more interactive, if that's possible. The location remains the same, a gorgeous old bank building with an actual vault, as does the pre-show, in which elegantly ghoulish artists - a ghostly ballerina, a haunting couple dancing, the creepiest mime ever — appear and disappear throughout the night. But this year, while you sip on your cocktails in the exquisitely cavernous, almostall-white lobby, you wait for The Tabulator to call you to one of four experiences, preselected by you when you buy the ticket.

Those experiences are part Sleep No More, part escape room — except neither of those analogies really does justice to the entire experience. In years past, you would wander through different live plays, silently seeking clues while wearing a creepy anonymous white mask. You could spend as much time as you liked anywhere in the Vault, but once you left you couldn't return. This go-round, you get to choose your experience, and to leave the experience you must complete your mission: to find a way to release the soul of the ghost trapped inside the rooms. Yes, rooms — the individual experiences aren't necessarily limited to one room. How do you complete your mission? You must solve a series of puzzles. Gone are the masks and the vow of silence, and each small group heads into the vault with a bank teller who may or may not channel the spirit of the soul wishing for release. Your teller will offer as much or as little help as you need to find the clues to release the soul.

"We want everyone to have a good experience," Swenson said.

And we did.

I shied away from The Child, the experience where John Roberts waits. John Roberts, you see, died as a child for reasons only described as mysterious, and, for whatever reason, his parents stored his soul in the vault for safekeeping (as one does) - but, like all the other souls wanting release, after 95 years in the "paranormal purgatory" (although I dearly wish I'd written that phrase, that's actually what they call it), the souls become the property of The Exchange National Bank. So, this young dead child

is looking for playmates to play with him and release him. It's also the room with the decaying child/doll, which is a step further than I'd like my ter-The Dominatrix mission — which none of us experienced - looks intriguing, although it imme-

> haunted S&M. We had hoped to release the soul of Dr. Truth. A practitioner of what they call "dark psychology,"


the Doctor is trapped reliving his own dark practices.

However, his experience sold out for the night we tried the Vault of Souls' new format. Fast. Apparently, Dr. Truth is fascinating, and, according to others who visited that particular room, also quite attractive.

And so we released the soul of Mr. Plutus, the bank guard. His soul resides alongside some of the coolest of the bank's physical objects, and I was immediately struck by how much this option felt like where Indiana Jones's soul might wait for final judgment. You can pick up and touch anything you like, but you may not disassemble or remove anything, lest you anger the soul you're trying to help - or any of the other wandering souls. (And about that: As you go through your mission, you will see no other living creatures, except for your teller. You will run across the odd soul. Talk to one of them, or in any way react to them, and your teller may think you're seeing things.)

As for the puzzle, even without the creepy dead baby/doll room experience of John Roberts, our experience reminded me a great deal of The 7th Guest, the '90s interactive movie puzzle video game, only an immersive

version. We had to solve the puzzles in one room to get to the next, and there was a persistent sense of foreboding about what was going to happen next. While I knew there was no real danger, the experience does unnerve.

The teller perfectly blended her craft with the atmosphere and created the exact type of experience we wanted. When we struggled with a clue and she offered help the first time, we welcomed it. The second time, my fiancé mumbled (in his delightful "cranky boat captain" way), "We're being led too much." She either heard him or sensed that we didn't want much help, and she backed off, which allowed us to solve the puzzles and make our own discoveries.

Here's where we made our mistake: We only made reservations for one room (you can reserve a second for half price), and, even though our group consisted of three people, we finished in 12 minutes (they set a soft 20-minute limit). Since the evening cost half of what it did last year, we should have booked two. However, while I'd like to tell you to book one at the start of the evening (7:30 p.m.) and one at the end, the two remaining weekends are so close to sold out that they're asking folks not to do that.

I would suggest you book before the afterdinner crowds arrive, because the longer the are when they get down to solve the puzzle, and the longer it takes them. Despite the best efforts of the Vault tellers and organizers to avoid running behind, we actually waited over an hour (we had an 8:45 p.m. check-in) because, as the creepy, giggling elevator operator explained to us, "People are drunnnnnnnk." Get there early and avoid that. The pre-show dancers, musicians, buskers and haunted vibe delighted us, but even with four experiences running simultaneously, it's hard to keep to a schedule when people don't want to leave the experience.

If you can't get an early booking, ask if your experience is running behind when you check in, and by how much. If there's a significant wait, perhaps pop next door to the Gin Joint, which has softly opened as an all-the-time restaurant and bar (as opposed to its former incarnation as an annual Vault of Souls-only after-party experience). If the block of Italian white cheddar cheese they allowed us to sample while waiting to go down to the Vault is any indication, the food will make the wait more enjoyable.

After you release your soul, your teller will take you upstairs, where you can share a drink with friends, watch the aerialist, mingle with spirits and meet the soul who, thanks to you, has escaped spending eternity in a

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Mini lights, mini lights...

In Roser Park, you never say this three times.

ni lights, mini lights, come out tonight.

Do you dare to say it thrice?

Despite being born and raised in St. Pete, I had not heard of the mini lights urban legend until my wife and I moved to Roser Park two years ago. Walking around Roser - a small and still-eclectic neighborhood despite its steady gentrification — I asked various neighbors: Have you heard of the mini lights?

I got mixed responses, though not one person volunteered to repeat the chant the three times required in order to conjure up the spirits of the minis.

Like many tales passed down through oral tradition, the legend of the mini lights has multiple versions. Though the exact location and names vary slightly depending on whom you ask, the most-oft agreed upon version of the folktale goes something like this: Residing under the bridge alongside Booker Creek in Historic Roser Park, tiny green people (the "mini lights") await

in the dark. Some sources say the little people were part of a circus from centuries past; others say the creatures belonged to a voodoo priestess who once lived in Roser Park.

All agree on one thing, though: Any time someone calls out "Mini lights, mini lights, come out tonight" three times, the minis will chase them down.

While the majority of my neighbors have indeed heard the legend, the source of their knowledge varies. Those who have lived in Roser Park for generations are well-versed. However much truth it holds, the story was traditionally told to local kids as a cautionary tale:

Do not enter the park after dark.

Recently, the mini lights legend has risen in popularity. The Tampa Bay Times wrote an article about it in 2016 and longtime local muralists the Vitale Brothers

are currently making a "skater horror film" based on the folktale. The Vitale Brothers' fundraising campaign has been an overwhelming success and Roser residents have already seen evidence of filming.

I walk along Booker Creek regularly. With its broad brick roads, hundred-plus-year-old oaks and sloping hills that belie the fact we

> are just blocks away from downtown St. Pete, Roser Park is quiet and serene and just different somehow. Spend an hour lounging in the grassy hills by the creek and you have a fair chance of seeing a bald eagle or otters; even manatees are known to drift by.

> > Stay after sunset, though, and a certain eeriness descends. The sense of solitude celebrated just hours prior grows spooky all of a sudden; something feels "off." The quiet is no longer soothing. The animals have disappeared, and it seems I should, too.

> > > Has anyone actually seen the mini lights? Nobody I

have met, though a few know someone who knows someone who has. I toy with the idea of walking through Roser after dark; my dad and I consider a night hike down the streets

and into neighboring Greenwood Cemetery. Ultimately I decide I'd rather not take my chances. I guess the superstition is beginning


The mini lights legend (and its evolution) speaks volumes about the history of development in south St. Pete. You can tell a lot about a place by the way its folktales are told; even more by focusing on who is doing the telling. I am intrigued to see the Vitale Brothers' film. I am hopeful the story will be done justice.

When asked whether or not our neighborhood is "safe" by potential buyers who spend Sunday afternoons driving slowly down the streets now full of construction company signs and freshly cleared lots reeking of recently chopped oak, I can guess at what I'm really being asked. Yes, there is some crime; no, we don't want to move. My wife and I describe the ups and the downs, the strong sense of community, and the tensions sometimes felt.

We never mention the mini lights.

On a recent visit to the park with our dogs, Steph and I pause at the sound of a car full of teenagers yelling out.

"Mini lights, mini lights, come out tonight." Upon seeing us, the teens pull to a stop and ask if we've heard of the legend; if we think it's real. I smile, shrug my shoulders and wink. 2!

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

t's a safe bet that you will see something for assembling all this eclectic artistry into the Festival that you have never seen before — its ninth season. According to Currie, the fes-

like last year's aptly named acrobatic troupe Gravity & Other Myths or performance artist Thaddeus Phillips's Border Crossing, a one-man, multilingual world tour.

This year promises to be no less eye-opening, with performances ranging from flip-book storytelling to a live-action video game. One event, a solo play called White Rabbit Red Rabbit, will not only be a surprise to the audi-

ence but to everyone involved in the production — because nobody knows what's in the script until the actor tears open an envelope.

Dwight Currie, the Ringling Museum of Art's Curator of Performance, is the man responsible

at Sarasota's Ringling International Arts four days' wonder that is RIAF, now entering

tival owes its existence to Florida State Senator John McKay and his unlikely alliance with, of all people, Mikhail Baryshnikov. The senator had connected with the world-famous dancer through a mutual acquaintance; once Baryshnikov's name was attached to the project, along with a proposed partnership between RIAF and his eponymous Arts Center in NYC, funding followed relatively easily.

The initiation of the festival coincided with what the museum likes to think of as "the Ringling renaissance," says Currie, when over a period of years beginning in the early 2000s four new structures were added to its campus,

allowing for an expansion in programming. In a city well-served by traditional arts, the idea of a festival that offered something different — something new, more experimental — made sense. Baryshnikov's celebrity helped bring it immediate attention - adding an unforgettable frisson to opening-night parties in the museum courtyard, when you'd see him wandering amongst the throngs like, you know, a regular human — and that affiliation lasted a successful five years. But now, says Currie, the festival has really found its stride.

"It's not as high-profile as it was when we had one of the most celebrated artists in the world affiliated with it," he says. "On the other hand, we will sell 4,000 to 5,000 tickets, a huge number when you take that as a percent of the local market."

RIAF, and the performances Currie curates throughout the year at the Ringling, fill a niche, he says, one that's different from what's offered by, say, Sarasota Opera or the Van Wezel. "Sarasota has long had its Broadway, has long had its Lincoln Center," he says, "but hasn't had until recently a downtown equivalent."

Nor, when you think of it, does Tampa Bay. It's rare to see adventurous, internationally known artists of this caliber anywhere around here, which makes RIAF that much more of a treasure. Plus, it's reasonably priced; no performances (other than the opening night

celebration) are more than \$35 a ticket, with student tickets available at \$10 apiece. All tickets include free admission to the museums, the gorgeous seaside Ca' d'Zan, and the gardens, and there are eateries on the grounds so you can catch a bite between the 2, 5 and 8 p.m. performances without having to drive elsewhere.

Here's a breakdown of the 2017 lineup, with comments by Currie.



White Rabbit Red Rabbit. A co-production of RIAF and Urbanite Theatre (a successful new company that, like RIAF, has proven that Sarasota audiences are willing to take a chance on the unpredictable), this is the play-in-an-envelope. Written by an Iranian playwright, Nassim Soleimanpour, who at the time of its writing was forbidden from leaving his country, WRRR has been described as part theater entertainment, part social experiment. It had a successful run in NY starring the likes of Whoopi Goldberg, Patrick Wilson and Nathan Lane, but if you want to experience it as the RIAF actors will, don't Google. Not even Currie knows what's in the script: "I made an active decision to not know." The play will be performed four times at RIAF by four different actors, then 10 more times (by 10 other actors) at Urbanite. (RIAF: Oct. 19, 2 & 8 p.m.; Oct. 20 & 21 at 2 p.m.)



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

Sound and safety

Musicians and local fans react to the Vegas music-festival shooting. **By Ray Roa**

The NRA remained

mostly silent, and pols

reminded us that it just

wasn't the time to talk

about gun control.

t's been three weeks since bleary-eyed Floridians woke up to news that a gunman had killed several people at the Route 91 Harvest music festival in Las Vegas. As the hours rolled on, and the internet did what it does, videos bounced off social networks like Snapchat and Twitter and onto mainstream news channels, warning viewers about the graphic images they were about to see. A click transported you to

the moment shots began to ring out from a 32nd-story balcony hundreds of yard from the stage.

Details unfolded, and

millionaire retired real estate investor named Stephen Paddock — stocked a massive arsenal of guns in the Mandalay Bay Hotel room from which he would fire upon the 22,000 people gathered to see country star Jason Aldean. What initially sounded like fireworks were actually bullets, fired from guns outfitted with bumpstocks (which allow semi-automatic weapons to fire more like automatic ones). As victims in the massive crowd were treated for wounds suffered on festival grounds, images of fallen festival attendees, lost Stetsons and crying cowboys made their way to the eyes of a watching world. Eventually, we learned that 59 people died in the terrorist attack media outlets have dubbed "the worst mass shooting in modern American history."

Aldean — who was just in Tampa for a boozy summertime performance at the

MidFlorida Credit Union Amphitheatre — took to Instagram to say that the events he witnessed were "beyond horrific." He sent thoughts and prayers to everyone involved, along with just about everybody else with a Facebook

account. Nonprofit pro-gun lobby The National show by Johnson — a laid-back pro surfer turned Rifle Association mostly remained silent, though, and pols reminded us that it just wasn't the right time to talk about gun control.

Still, at the center of it all was the truly horrific reminder of the reality that even concerts — where the world goes to be moved by

the simple sound of a song — were never truly sacred spaces safe from the twisted fantasies of some asshole with a gun.

"I don't know what to make of it, really. Like most people, I am in shock and a little bit of denial," vacht-rock singer Michael McDonald told CL in an interview days after the shooting. McDonald, 65, is scheduled to play the Clearwater Jazz Holiday on October 21, and

> noted that he hunted and collected guns in his younger days. "I was fascinated by guns, but for some reason this NRA lobby pro-

we learned that the shooter — a 64-year-old, hibits us from even bringing up the subject of why we're making it easier for mentally impaired people to buy firearms."



And at Friday's Band of Horses show at Jannus Live, a most enduring symbol of a collective scene's unbreakable spirit manifested itself in 8-year-old Legend Billington, who attended the concert with his mom Lauren. She admitted to being nervous about the plethora of dark windows that sit above and around the famed courtyard venue, but made a conscious decision to watch the show from the outer edge of

"We paid attention to the exits, and I made sure Legend knew all his emergency numbers and his address," Lauren, 43, told CL, adding that discussing a tragedy like Vegas is a fine line for a kid his age. "I have not had to explain it to him — instead we talk about good, critical thinking in the case of an emergency."

But why would she bring an 8-year-old to a rock show?

"For one, he loves the band," she said, adding that every memory she has is related to a song, lyric band or venue. Billington won't let anyone take that away from her or her family, and wants her kids to experience as much of the world as possible without being ruled by fear. "There are many risks we take daily. I'm more anxious about taking them to national monuments, Disney World, and sports events than I am about bringing them to smaller local

"I tell my sons all the time that 'we only get each day once," she added before inadvertently explaining Bay area music fans' resilience in the face of horror:

"They are encouraged to be positive risktakers and to do the things that they love with the people they love."

Taking risks for the love of live music. That's the simple answer for why we go to concerts, and it's the simple reason why we'll never let anything take those experiences away from us. 31

Wordplay: Deezy Wee's local flavor

Thanks to Deezy Wee The Reaper, the slogan "Beyobe made this shit the other night" is as popular a tag in the Tampa Bay hip-hop community as "If Young Metro don't trust you" is in the genre at large — and that was the Bay area rapper's plan all along.

Deezy Wee The Reaper was born and raised here. When slapped against signature basslines from Tampa producer Beyobe's 808 drum machine/sampler — like it is on a new EP, Pickled Oranges - Deezy Wee's flair for whimsically narrating life in his hometown makes for an infectious sound that could score the muggiest of Tampa nights.

"The name, the content, all of it is just us having fun," Deezy Wee told CL. While the title Pickled Oranges does bring a certain level of childlike curiosity to mind, the EP holds a deeper meaning to The Reaper, and this project sparked a plan within the rapper to outdo his past work as a musician. After releasing an initial single "Jetro" in the spring of this year, Deezy Wee decided to halt all other projects to devote enough time to the EP. Pickled Oranges instantly became a two-week cabin fever-like recording session between Beyobe and The Reaper.

"The EP happened quickly. I would be in the studio making a beat, He'd walk in and just start writing. We might be in the studio for 12 hours at a time between him writing and me doing post-production stuff," Beyobe added.

"Pickled Oranges became a personal artist experiment between Beyobe and me," said Deezy Wee. "We were trying to build something bigger than money. We were building relationships that will last."

A wordsmith by trade and artist by nature, The Reaper was a drawn to an empty canvas at an early age. He hasn't been able to stop drawing since he could first hold a crayon, but music made its way into his life later. "I have my drawings from first grade at my mom's house. I kept everything. I kept homework if I doodled on it. I'm a hoarder when it comes to art," he chuckled.

In the sixth grade, The Reaper's relationship with music evolved into a knack for crafting wicked phrases, which led to freestyling and then finally to writing along with music. After experiencing the joy of making the sounds in his mind come alive, Deezy Wee knew he wanted to pursue music seriously. His focus has been slinging rhymes for the past eight years, and while inspiration is everywhere, finding a balance between music and art has proved difficult.

"I never like doing the same thing for too long," he said, adding that the drive has to come from within. "I try different things that challenge me because there isn't anybody else there to do that."

He spent the summer dropping teasers from the EP on social media, and on October 1, The Reaper released his second single from Pickled Oranges, "Pop Rocks." The track features high-energy production laced with pinging piano keys; Deezy Wee's southern diction and descriptive wordplay lead the way. The full EP hits streaming platforms on Halloween, an appropriate holiday to mark the end of The Reaper's trippy journey.

"Being focused is what's trippy because people often stray away from their plan," he said. 'I stuck to mine and that was make *Pickled* Oranges and do it right." - Casey Jeanite














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
