PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

In this issue of the magazine, you will read about the launch of our “Building Courageous Leaders” initiative. You will read about what this initiative entails, why it evolved, how it will be the basis of our positioning and messaging efforts, how it will be integrated into our educational programming, and the launch of our new Leadership Institute. That is your “tease” to read more within these pages!

But why “courageous” leaders, you may ask.

The mission of Phi Gamma Delta has always been about preparing men to be contributors to their greater communities, whether our fraternity, campuses, businesses, organizations, teams, neighborhoods or religious institutions. To be a contributor to society requires several attributes, but a critical component is a grounding in a set of core values that drive decision making and behavior. Phi Gamma Delta’s values of Friendship, Knowledge, Service, Morality and Excellence serve that purpose and should be an inseparable and integral part of our DNA.

Through our mission we also strive to develop leadership skills in our members. This includes all the classic skills of leadership: creating a vision for the future, developing plans for execution, implementing those plans through follow up and holding others accountable for their results, and building a strong sense of team.

But at times, all leaders find themselves in a situation where difficult decisions and actions are required. Situations where the course is unclear and disruptive. Situations where fear may paralyze action. Situations that put the leader in the minority against strong opposition. Situations where the leader may feel that he has neither the energy nor the skills to take on the challenge.

It is in these most crucial times that courage is essential, courage to make tough decisions and follow through with action. To muster that courage, a leader must have a strong foundation that never changes regardless of the circumstances; a basis for distinguishing right from wrong. That solid foundation can come from our values. When a leader can take on those

difficult situations grounded in a clear understanding of and commitment to our values, he will make the right decisions.

In our framing of leadership, we call these critical situations “testing points.” They test or challenge the leader to make difficult decisions and take tough actions that may fundamentally alter the direction of the organization. They test the leader to make the “right” decision.

An analogy for courageous leadership might be sailing across a large body of open water. The first step in navigating across the water is to identify a destination, something to fix your focus on, that does not move and provides reference for your position. Our core values are like that unchangeable destination that provides guidance and reference to determine if we are on course.

As you journey across the water, the winds and currents are constantly pushing you off course, much the same way leaders and organizations face issues, challenges and temptations that can push them off course. The ship’s captain must continually make decisions and course corrections to keep the ship moving toward the destination. Our chapter leaders find themselves in similar situations that require decisions and actions to keep the organization on course in accordance with our core values. These are testing points. Like the ship that starts only slightly off course, there may be little impact in the short term. The ship or organization is off course only by inches. But over time, if the leader fails to act, an error of inches becomes an error of miles. Small issues can balloon over time, making course corrections much more difficult, requiring much more effort and becoming much more disruptive.

When reading about Building Courageous Leaders, you may find words like “new”, “launch” or “initiative” to describe the work. But in many ways, it is not new and is not an initiative. Although there are many aspects to the Building Courageous Leaders effort (and some are new), it is as much about an effort to refocus on what Phi Gamma Delta has been about for the last 168 years -- preparing men to be contributors to society by instilling a strong set of core values and teaching the skills to be a courageous leader when faced with a testing point. It’s what we’ve always been about.

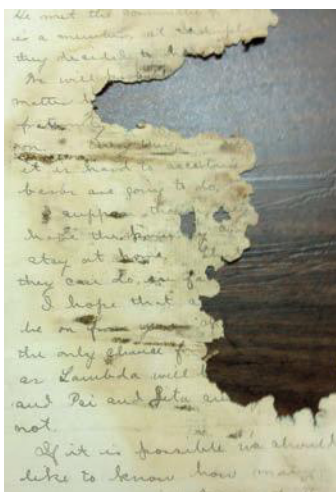

PHI GAMMA DELTA SUPPORTS ORGAN AND TISSUE DONATIONS THREE BROTHERS' STORIES TELL WHY

My name is **Edward Gulewitz, Jr. (Texas Christian 1990)**. I was born with a hereditary disease called cystic fibrosis. Most people are diagnosed with this disease in their infancy or early childhood. I wasn't diagnosed until I was 30 years old. There is no cure for this disease and the treatment is for symptoms only. CF weakens the immune system, and patients are unable to fight off infections such as the common cold and flu.

Despite the various medications and treatments that I was receiving, my illness eventually progressed to chronic lung failure. My doctor told me that I should consider a double lung transplant. After additional testing, I was added to the national "waiting list" on October 15, 2013. My health had deteriorated so much that there was a good chance that I would not survive long enough to receive a transplant.

Being on the list made me both hopeful and scared. You realize that you need a transplant, but a double lung transplant can only come from a deceased donor. I wrestled with the emotions of guilt and fear. A transplant recipient alleviated some of my anxiety by explaining to me that even though doctors work to save every patient, sometimes it cannot be done. Some families seek ways to cope with their loss. For some, an organ or tissue donation gives meaning to the tragic death of a loved one since it gives the gift of life to others who have no other option.

I got "the call" from the hospital on January 4, 2014, at 8:30 p.m. My procedure went very smoothly and lasted only 4 ½ hours, instead of the anticipated 8 hours.

I was breathing with new my lungs the next day. I regained my strength very quickly. I was standing two days after my surgery. I walked 1,000 feet and climbed a short flight of stairs the day after

that. They brought a treadmill to my room. I walked every day until I was released from the hospital, just 12 days after surgery.

My new lungs are always at risk for infection and rejection. I take a large regimen of medications in order to prevent this, and there is constant monitoring of my blood levels and lung functions. There have been no signs of rejection of my new lungs. I can do almost anything a 'normal' healthy person can.

My donor's mother wrote me about her son, Brandon, whose donation saved my life. It is an emotional thing to read about the family and the person who gave you another chance at life. I am extremely grateful for and humbled by my donor's gift.

I volunteer for Mid America Transplant. One day, they sent me a request to help with donor registration at an event at the St. Louis Union Station. To my surprise, it turned out that the event was the 2016 Fiji Academy! The Immortal Phi Gam Project is so intertwined with my life since I am a Fiji and the recipient of a lung transplant that it was as if God had placed me in this situation to further the Fraternity's efforts to increase the number of people registered as organ donors. The brothers that I met at the Academy welcomed my contributions and made me feel even closer to the Fraternity that has blessed me with a brotherhood that continues to grow within me every day.

I will always be in debt to the family of my donor and those who have supported me, especially my amazing wife of 15 years, Anita. They have given meaning to my life in ways that are beyond description.

Please speak with your family and loved ones about organ and tissue donation. Consider the gift of life that we all possess. Support the Immortal Phi Gam Project!

Connor Henderson (Vanderbilt 2016) embodies what it means to be a courageous leader. This past fall, Connor became a stem cell donor, resulting in a life-saving operation for a 62 year-old man with acute myeloid leukemia. Connor bravely agreed to be a donor when he found out he was a match.

Connor took time off from classes in order to complete rigorous testing and the eventual procedure – known as a peripheral blood stem cell donation – at Emory University Hospital in Atlanta. Connor's commitment still took a toll. Fatigue and body aches plagued him before and after the procedure, making the normal stresses of his senior year much more difficult. It normally takes six weeks for donors to fully recover from the procedure.

Connor is quick to point out how lucky he was to even have the opportunity to save a life. The odds of being a potential match for anybody needing bone marrow are 540 to 1. Connor never would have registered to be a bone marrow donor had he not been swabbed at a donor drive hosted at the Gamma Chapter house at Vanderbilt.

Connor has used his leadership skills to inspire countless others to be courageous leaders. As co-chair of Vanderbilt Alternative Spring Break and a peer coach at the Career Center, Connor has dedicated his life to serving others and being a courageous leader. He says the donor experience was one of the most rewarding things he has ever done. He encourages everyone to register as a bone marrow donor.

MAKE YOURSELF IMMORTAL

Phi Gamma Delta has teamed up with Donate Life to increase the number of organ donors across North America. There are more than 125,000 people waiting for an organ transplant in the United States and Canada, with approximately 150 names added to the waiting list every day. Bob Lawrie (LaSalle 1992) was only 18 years old when he was diagnosed with IgA Nephropathy, an inflammation of the glomerula in the kidneys. He was told that he would not need to worry about a kidney transplant until he was in his late 50's. Unfortunately, he only made it to age 24 before he would need a transplant. Thankfully, his father was a match and was able to donate one of his kidneys.

Robert's life would progress normally over the course of the next 17 years. He married his wife, Kimberly. She gave birth to their two sons, Christian (9) and Aidan (5). He is employed as a health care executive for a large insurance company.

An error during a medical procedure caused his transplanted kidney to begin to fail in 2010 when he was 41. In 2012, Bob began receiving dialysis treatments five days a week in his home.

His original plan was to live with his father's kidney as long as possible. Then, if something happened to that kidney, his sister would be available as a potential donor. Unfortunately, his sister passed away from an aggressive form of breast cancer one year before he needed his second kidney transplant. He doesn't have any other family members available to donate a kidney to him.

He was blessed to have had his father's kidney perform normally for 17 years. Unfortunately, that blessing was also a curse. His body developed very high levels of antibodies that will make it extremely difficult for him to find a new kidney. Some medical progress is being made. Treatments involving the "stripping" of antibodies has shown some success. Unfortunately, thus far these treatments have only been effective using kidneys from living donors.

Several friends and fellow church members have been tested to see if they are a match, but his high levels of antibodies have prevented his doctors from finding a match. Bob has discussed with many others the possibility of donating a kidney, but unfortunately no one has been able to do it because of their current life/family situations. A hoped-for "paired exchange" -- where a donor would provide a kidney to someone else in exchange for Bob receiving a matching kidney from a different donor -- fell through due to changes in the prospective donor's personal situation.

Obviously, his situation is very stressful. Bob states, "I live every day knowing that I could experience a complication with dialysis that could alter the course of my life, and quite possibly result in my death."

He hopes that his story will cause his fraternity brothers and others to register as an organ donor and support the Immortal Phi Gam Project. As he puts it, "Too many people don't make their wishes known prior to an unfortunate situation happening. Then, the burden of deciding to donate a family member's organs falls on their family, who, because of the emotions of the situation, are unable to make that decision."

He also wants to give hope to others by letting them know that he has lived a happy and productive life for 17 years as an organ transplant recipient and four years and counting on dialysis. He says, "Dialysis is not a death sentence. It is a means to prolong someone's life until they can receive an organ transplant."

Bob's greatest hope is that he will receive a kidney from a living donor because, as he told us, "I want nothing more than to be here for my wife and children for years to come."

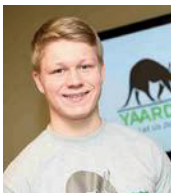
ON CAMPUS HAPPENINGS

THE 5TH QUARTER INITIATIVE

Four years ago, Theta at Alabama, with the help of Dean Azar and his son **Joseph Azar (2014)**, started The 5th Quarter Initiative to salvage food from concessions at Alabama's Bryant-Denny Stadium. This initiative has continued to run thanks to student volunteers from the Theta Chapter and the Alpha Gamma Delta women's fraternity. After each home football game, gymnastics meet or men's basketball game, 4 to 15 volunteers package leftover or extra food, which the West Alabama Food Bank oversees for packaging and end delivery of the food. During the fall 2015



football season, 10,648 lbs. of food (over 13,000 meals) were salvaged, making a total of 47,315 lbs. (58,000 meals) salvaged to date.



Currently, the Chapter is working on creating a formalized strategy and deployment plan to facilitate program expansion to other stadiums and schools. 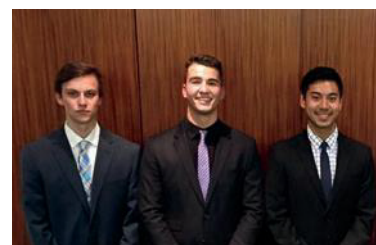

SCHOLARSHIP: MORE THAN JUST GOOD GRADES

William R. Bracewell (Georgia 1968) - Educational Director

To consider the meaning of scholarship to Phi Gamma Delta in 2016, we must first review the origin of the obligation all graduate and undergraduate brothers share to pursue knowledge and achieve scholarship. Phi Gamma Delta finds her origin in the lives of six undergraduate students at Jefferson College in 1848. If, instead, the fraternity had been developed by a group of businessmen who met monthly for lunch in downtown Canonsburg, Pennsylvania, we would probably all be members of a civic organization with no direct relationship to higher education. Fortunately, the founders of our fraternity were students and forever we are in partnership with higher education. All of our chapters now and in the future will be associated with an institution of higher education. This partnership requires that scholarship remain a cornerstone of the Fraternity. Even a cursory review of the laws of the fraternity, our ritual and our history reveals the significance of scholarship in forming and maintaining the fraternity.

The curriculum in colleges at the time our fraternity was first organized was narrow. Bill Parrish, the Historian for Phi Gamma Delta, reports that the curriculum at Westminster College, his alma mater, in the 1850's consisted of "geography, history, antiquities, poetry and literature of the scriptures and of classic authors. It is the design, in a word, to put Jerusalem, Athens and Rome abreast." He reports there were no electives and no course in any branch of science. Jefferson College probably had a similar curriculum. Yet, the students enrolled there conceived of scholarship as comprised of two elements: pursuing knowledge (active learning) and academic achievement. The students observed that attending class, taking notes and cramming for exams was a too shallow approach to becoming truly educated. Perhaps this dichotomy was debated in the Franklin Society.

It is interesting that not too many years ago all learning was believed to take place only in the classroom, the library and the laboratory. Out-of-classroom activities were considered, at best, distractions and, at worst, anti-academic. In fact, literary societies like the Franklin So-

ciety played an important part of education in the 19th century, and in a way were precursors to what today is referred to as "experiential learning". The American Association of Colleges and Universities includes this kind of academic experience on a list of practices that have been shown to be particularly beneficial to students. These experiences include internships, study abroad, service learning and faculty supervised research. Fortunately, the founders of our fraternity set the stage for us to embrace this current expanded definition of higher education. Our Fraternity has always offered our members opportunities to develop leadership skills, interpersonal skills, and organizational skills, but most institutions have been unwilling to acknowledge these contributions to education. Today, these very skills are valued and are part of the desired results of experiential learning.

Regardless of history, the current institutional academic programs should be seen as an opportunity for our fraternity to cement our relationship with our host institutions. Phi Gamma Delta can today demonstrate our partnership with the host institutions by continuing to support traditional scholarship programs in our chapters and incorporating into these programs support and encouragement for participation in study abroad, service learning, internships and research.

Graduate brothers, who already understand the importance of continuing education, can be a part of experiential learning by participating in chapter programs to explain the importance of pursuing knowledge through many avenues while an undergraduate and as a graduate. Making parents aware of these new opportunities for their sons will produce another kind of support for the chapters as they join with the fraternity in encouraging full participation in the resources provided on campus. The bottom line is that Phi Gamma Delta can demonstrate our continuing commitment to be a partner in higher education and that the values of our fraternity are relevant now and will continue to be as our brothers continue to pursue knowledge and achieve scholarship.

SPRING 2016 EXPANSION RESULTS

It is an exciting time of the year as we have completed spring colonizations at the University of California Davis, the University of Richmond and the University of Tennessee Chattanooga. The staff leading these projects have created constant energy and fresh perspectives on recruitment methods, and we have been very impressed with the quality and drive of the future Phi Gams we have met.

UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA DAVIS

When the colonization at University of California Davis, a top 50 National University, was completed, we welcomed 25 men to Phi Gamma Delta. Director of Expansion Matt Farrell and Field Secretary Trevor Curtis spent two months in Davis, CA to help establish the Delta Colony. These men represent six different countries, have a combined 3.21 GPA and are involved with UCD rugby, crew and Student Senate. Additionally, we were able to establish a Sacramento graduate brother network during the colonization, and local brothers interested in getting

WILKINSON AWARD WINNER ALREADY MAKING GLOBAL IMPACT

Of Nigerian and Ghanaian roots, but born in Xenia, Ohio, and raised in Centerville, **Memme Onwudiwe (Ohio Wesleyan 2015)** traveled only about 90 miles from home to attend Ohio Wesleyan University. But the distance our 2015 Wilkinson Award winner has traveled since arriving at Ohio Wesleyan in fall 2011—and the difference he has made—tell a striking story.

An international studies and French double major and summa cum laude graduate, Memme was a familiar face to many (if not most) people at Ohio Wesleyan when he was a student. His involvement in organizations ranging from student government to Big Brothers Big Sisters mentoring program, and Greek life to President's Club, made him an influential member of the OWU community.

In March 2012, Memme joined 38 other students as a founder of the Delta Colony to revitalize the Theta Deuteron Chapter, which had closed in 2008. He worked hard to rebuild the Chapter, helping to create and co-chair a new health committee, develop the colony website, serve as captain of the intramural soccer team, and chair the scholarship and brotherhood committees.

Academically, he earned a 3.95 GPA and was inducted into Phi Beta Kappa. He also took full advantage of The OWU

Connection, a program that combines traditional liberal arts with practical experience, securing internships that allowed him to travel to his family's ancestral homeland in Nigeria to learn more about the country's electoral processes and energy production transactions.

Eventually, all these efforts helped earn Memme the Wilkinson Award as Phi Gamma Delta's most outstanding senior. The award is especially meaningful at Ohio Wesleyan because it is named in honor of Cecil J. "Scoop" Wilkinson (Ohio Wesleyan 1917), who served the Fraternity as executive secretary and editor of *The Phi Gamma Delta* magazine from 1923 to 1959.

By coincidence, Memme earned another prestigious honor that is named for an Ohio Wesleyan brother. The Meek Leadership Award, established by Philip J. Meek and his wife, Nancy LaPorte Meek, both 1959 graduates, recognizes OWU seniors who have demonstrated exceptional leadership service and show promise to sustain that commitment throughout their lives.

In his speech at the Fiji Academy after accepting the Wilkinson Award, Memme said of Theta Deuteron graduate brothers, "It is because of their character, hard work and dedication to the ideals of Phi Gamma Delta that I can truly declare, whole-heartedly, that I am proud to be a Fiji!"

It's easy to see that Memme set his sights high. His interests and energy far surpassed the boundaries of Delaware, Ohio, and the campus community that he loves. During his four years at OWU, he completed an internship with the Independent National Electoral Commission in Abuja, Nigeria, helping to oversee the electoral process in the country, and also interned for Development Finance International, Inc., a business advisory firm in Bethesda, Maryland, that focuses on emerging markets.

A TRANSFORMATIVE SUMMER IN NIGERIA

With a global-minded perspective at his core, Memme has expanded his leadership activities since his graduation in May 2015. Only weeks later, he was back in Nigeria, this time under sponsorship of the Jan W. Baran '70 and Kathryn K. Baran Endowed Fund for Encouragement of Post-Graduate Fellowships, an OWU program that links classroom theory to real-world experiences.

And for Memme, Nigeria was the clear place to start. During his internship at Development Finance International, he was exposed to new insights on Nigeria's oil and gas industry, and he decided to use them as the foundation for an independent research project on public policy around Nigeria's use of and payment for oil and gas.

The Baran Fellowship was a key first step toward making this pursuit a reality.

"When I heard about the Baran Fellowship, I knew just what I wanted to do," he says. He spent the summer of 2015 as a research fellow at Nigeria Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (NEITI), an organization focused on building a framework for transparency in Nigeria's use of and payment for oil and gas. What proved to be a formative and important summer was also in some ways a homecoming, as he stayed with his father, who lives in Nigeria.

At NEITI, Memme's research focused on the role that stronger civil society organizations (CSOs) could play in creating policies for transparency in the Nigerian oil and gas industry. According to NEITI, a civil society organization is defined as a non-governmental organization, primarily involved in advocacy for free, equitable, and better society.

"Each year, NEITI audits the oil and gas industry and reports back to the government on issues that it finds, but policy changes rarely happen as a result," Onwudiwe explains. "At the end of the day, it seems that you can't just tell the government what is wrong or what to do—pressure is needed from the people." Could a stronger voice from civil society organizations make a difference? He spent the summer beginning to unpack this question.

"I spent a lot of time exploring relationships," Memme reflects. "I interviewed CSOs, the NEITI Civil Society Steering Committee, global development banks, and international organizations that support civil society in Nigeria. I examined overall roadblocks and problems and how they came to be." While his research was highly independent, he was embraced by the community at NEITI and frequently invited to events, discussions, and round-tables.

"Everyone was really interested in my research," he recalls. "The culture there was very transparent, and even the executive director engaged me. Many people were willing to sit down with me and share the story of what they were



trying to accomplish."

Partially inspired by his heritage, Onwudiwe sees a bigger picture to his research. "Ghana just recently discovered oil reserves," he points out, "and I want to use my research in Nigeria to help Ghana as they potentially experience the same issues moving forward."

A FUTURE OF POSSIBILITIES

Memme now has his sights set on a law degree, with plans to attend Harvard Law School this fall. There he will join fellow Theta Deuteron Colony founder **Andrew Paik (2014)**.

Memme laughs, remembering his first months as a freshman at OWU. "I never pictured myself winning any type of award. But then I was given the Most Outstanding Freshman Award, and I started to realize that Ohio Wesleyan was a place that believed in me. They boosted me, they recognized me, and they encouraged me to aim for higher and higher things. That's why I am where I am today."

To Memme, the Baran Fellowship was yet another way the OWU community continues to encourage and support him, even beyond his days on campus.

"I don't know for sure what the future will hold," he says. "From law school, the possibilities are endless. But I do know that OWU has been willing to give me this chance, to invest in me, to take a risk on me, and to say, 'We think you're worth it.' That's all the confidence I need to go forward from here."

The 2016 Academy was the Fraternity's largest to date and was held January 8-10, 2016 at the historic Union Station Hotel in Saint Louis, Missouri. A success by all accounts, the Academy brought together undergraduate and graduate leaders for a weekend of learning and brotherhood. Here are some highlights from this historic event.

1 BY THE NUMBERS

The 2016 Fiji Academy was the largest to date with **722 brothers and guests in attendance** (our previous record was 667 in 2015).

- Undergraduates: **561**
- Chapters/Colonies: **156**
- Chapters/Colonies that sent 3+ delegates: **45** (*Kappa Omicron at Oregon State, Rho Phi at Rose Hulman and Psi at Wabash each sent 9 brothers!*)
- Graduates: **149**

- Section Chiefs: **31**

2 OFFICER TRAINING

With most chapters and colonies electing new officers in the fall, the Academy provides an excellent setting to prepare and train these officers. On Saturday, the 2016 Academy again featured training for elected officers - Presidents, Treasurers, Recording Secretaries, Corresponding Secretaries and Historians - as well as Recruitment Chairmen, Pledge Edu-

cators and Emerging Leaders. In addition, undergraduates could attend breakout sessions on topics such as Courageous Leadership, Working on a Team, Sexual Assault Prevention, Ritual Education and Risk Management Education.

Graduate volunteers, including Section Chiefs, Purple Legionnaires and others in attendance, were also afforded training, along with a dedicated New Purple Legionnaire session.

3 PURSUING EXCELLENCE

Brothers who arrived earlier in the day on Friday could participate in Pursuing Excellence sessions - and several hundred did! These sessions focused on both personal development and chapter operations, and topics included resume writing, developing networking skills, business writing, scholarship, planning philanthropy events, graduate relations, hazing prevention and fraternity awards.

The Fiji Academy invited a number of guest speakers and presenters, including T.J. Sullivan, a well-known speaker



on college campuses. On Saturday morning T.J. shared a message he calls Motivating the Middle. He shared with our undergraduate leaders practical tips to help them motivate and lead their members based on those members' chosen level of engagement.

5 UNVEILING BUILDING COURAGEOUS LEADERS

The 2016 Academy unveiled the Fraternity's new Building Courageous Leaders Initiative (see p. 40). **Archon President Mike Lucas (Bradley 1983)** (left) announced the initiative at Friday's Opening Banquet by helping brothers understand what it means to lead with courage and how the new initiative came about.

Saturday night's closing banquet and Pig Dinner also helped brothers understand Building Courageous Leaders. **Archon Treasurer Glenn Moor (Texas Tech 1984)** told the story of a Courageous Leader, **Darryn Andrews (Texas Tech 1998)**, who was mortally wounded saving fellow soldiers in Afghanistan. **Archon Councilor Seth Bland (Western Kentucky 2016)** (right) explained some of the testing points our undergraduate men face and how courageous leadership can help confront those difficult decisions. **Archon Councilor Clark Robertson (Nebraska 1982)** shared how the Fraternity aims to Build Courageous Leaders and some of the programs and steps Phi Gamma Delta will take to roll out this initiative.

DISTINGUISHED FIJI AWARD

He also chairs the board of directors of Ohio Campus Compact, a statewide non-profit coalition of college and university presidents and campuses working to promote and develop the civic purposes of higher education. Brother DiBiasio received his master's degree and Ph.D. from Ohio State University.

Brother Hancock was a Member of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Alberta from 1997 to 2014 and spent his entire provincial political career in cabinet. His cabinet positions included Minister of Intergovernmental & Aboriginal Affairs, Minister of Justice & Solicitor General, Attorney General, and Minister of Advanced Education, to name a few. As Minister of Advanced Education, he championed the Access to the Future Act, which created a \$1 billion endowment fund for post-secondary education, a fund that is now valued at \$3 billion and has provided over \$350 million in funding to advanced learning in the Province. In 2014 he was named interim leader of the Progressive Conservative Party and was appointed Premier of Alberta. Dave has also dedicated many years of service to Phi Gamma Delta. He has served on the board of the Alberta Fiji Society for 15 years, including terms as president and secretary. He also has served on the board of the Phi Gamma Delta Foundation of Canada for a total of 11 years and recently returned to the Foundation board for another term.

WILLIAM G. PAUL (OKLAHOMA 1952)

Brother Paul serves as an of counsel attorney in the Crowe & Dunlevy law firm in Oklahoma City, OK. He began his career at the firm in 1957 and served as chairman of the firm's Executive Committee from 1974 to 1979. From 1985 to 1995 he was senior vice president and general counsel of Phillips Petroleum, returning to Crowe & Dunlevy in 1996 as advisory director. Brother Paul has held leadership positions in the American Bar Association (ABA), National Conference of Bar Presidents, American Bar Endowment (ABE), Oklahoma Bar Association, American Bar Foundation, University of Oklahoma College of Law, and the Center for American & International Law. Most notably, he served as president of the ABA from 1999 to 2000 and as a member of the board of directors of the ABE from 1986 to 2000. He has served as director emeritus of the ABE since 2000 and as a member of the ABA House of Delegates since 1979. His honors are numerous, including the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Oklahoma Bar Association (2000), the Distinguished Alumni Award from the University of Oklahoma College of Arts and Sciences (1999), and the Joe Stamper Distinguished Service Award from the Oklahoma Bar Association (2003). Also in 2003, he was inducted into the Oklahoma Hall of Fame.

BILL D. SNYDER (WILLIAM JEWELL 1962)

Brother Snyder recently completed his 24th season as the head football coach at Kansas State University. His first season in Manhattan was 1989. The Wildcats' last win prior to that season was in October 1986. In his third year, 1991, the team finished 7-4, and in 1993 went to the first of 11 consecutive bowl games. In 1998 the Wildcats went undefeated in the regular season; in 2003 they won the Big 12 championship. Coach Snyder retired after the 2005 season but returned after the 2008 season. During his first season back, the team tied for second in the Big 12 North division. In 2012 he led the Wildcats to the school's first number one ranking in the BCS standings and its first Big 12 Conference championship since

2003. Over his career, Kansas State has finished in the final rankings of the major college football polls on 13 occasions, with six rankings in the top 10. Coach Snyder has received several conference and national coach of the year awards, including the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award (1998 and 2013), the Sporting News National Coach of the Year (2011), and Big 12 Conference Coach of the Year (1998, 2002, 2011 and 2012). In recognition of his leadership of one of the most successful rebuilding projects in the history of college athletics, on January 9, 2015, he was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame.

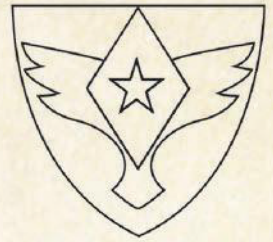
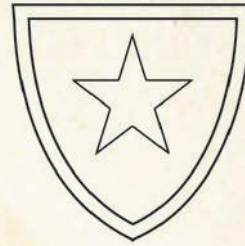
D. LAWRENCE WICKERHAM, M.D. (WASHINGTON & JEFFERSON 1972)

Brother Wickerham is a leader in cancer research, with over 30 years of experience in the design, conduct and analysis of international research studies. Currently, he is the associate chairman of the National Surgical Adjuvant Breast and Bowel Project (NSABP), a federally funded international cancer research network. He is Associate Professor of Medicine at Temple University in Pittsburgh, PA, and is Chief of Cancer Genetics and Prevention at Allegheny General Hospital. Dr. Wickerham's research has resulted in dramatic improvement in the care and quality of life for women with breast cancer. Recognition for his contributions to his profession include the Maurice Cleveland Waltersdorf Award for Innovative Leadership (2013), the Potamkin Award from the Pennsylvania Break Cancer Coalition (2006), and the Adams County Break Cancer Coalition's first annual Break Cancer Research Award (2004). After graduating from medical school at the University of Pittsburgh in 1976, Dr. Wickerham completed a four-year tour of duty as a medical officer for the U.S. Navy. His service to Phi Gamma Delta includes many years on the board of the Alpha Association, the house corporation for the Alpha Chapter at Washington & Jefferson College. He was vice president of the Association from 1995 to 2003 and has served as president since that time.

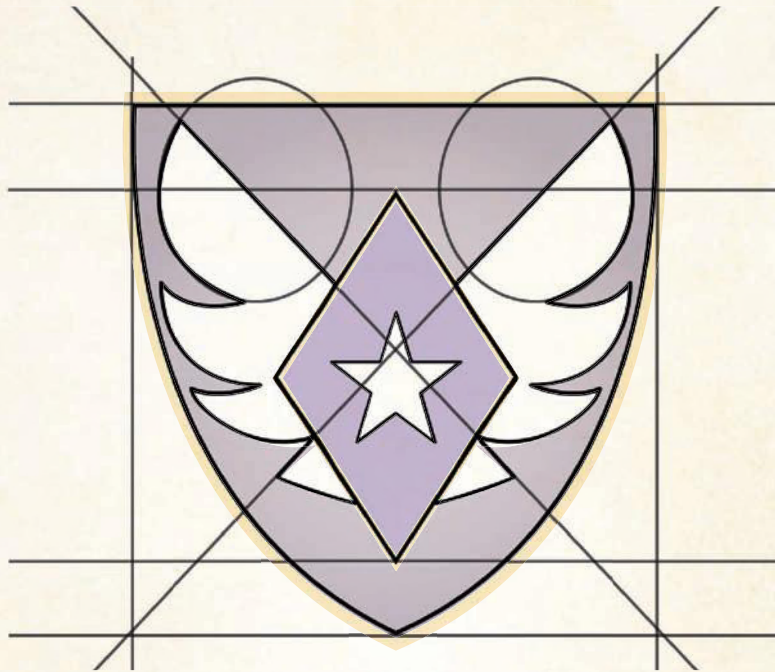

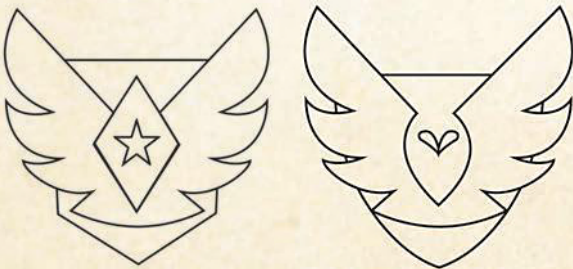

"Courage is not simply one of the virtues, but the form of every virtue at the testing point."

- C. S. Lewis

WHAT IS BUILDING COURAGEOUS LEADERS?

Have you ever watched someone take a firm stand on a difficult issue and quietly admired their character and courage? Did you hope that you would respond the same way if faced with a similar test?

Have you ever been faced with a challenging choice, taken the easy way, rather than what you knew to be the right way, and regretted it later?

Those are testing points.

We are compelled by the above description of courage from author C. S. Lewis. In Phi Gamma Delta we talk frequently about our values of Friendship, Knowledge, Service, Morality and Excellence. But it is one thing to talk about values and another altogether to act on those values when they are tested. It is true in so many aspects of life, including fraternity, that many problems could be averted if someone – whether a formal leader or a bystander – had the courage to assert their values, or the group's espoused values, at the testing point.

Each of us is certain to confront many testing points in our lives. Some will be minor decisions, while others will have a profound impact on us and on others. Likewise, chapter leaders will face many testing points that will impact the future of their chapter, their brothers, and sometimes the Fraternity at large.

This is why Phi Gamma Delta has embarked on an initiative to Build Courageous Leaders. A focus on courageous leadership challenges brothers to be the best Fijis that they can be. It can give them the tools they need to face the testing points that are inevitable throughout their lives and to gain the satisfaction from knowing that they have done the right thing. ▶

HOW WILL PHI GAMMA DELTA DEVELOP & SUPPORT COURAGEOUS LEADERS?

We have identified three elements of courageous leadership.

The first is to Understand our Values. Real authority in leading a chapter comes through a common understanding of our values and how they apply in everyday life. As Phi Gams, we find inspiration in knowing that the essential elements of our Ritual originated with our Founders in 1848. Even so, those values are not relics of a previous age. They are alive today in Phi Gamma Delta in ways both large and small, visible and invisible. Like all the other goals of the Fraternity, Building Courageous Leaders begins with an understanding of the timeless principles in our Ritual.

The second step to courageous leadership is to Recognize Testing Points -- to know when our values are being challenged and to understand the implications and potential consequences of a particular choice. Some testing points are obvious, but some are not. One of the purposes of our programs in risk management, the prevention of sexual misconduct, alcohol, and hazing prevention is to educate brothers on the consequences of choices -- how a particular choice or action can affect a brother, other people, a chapter and the Fraternity. These programs and others will be revised to incorporate the concept of testing points so that brothers are better prepared to recognize them.

The third step is the most challenging. With an understanding of our values and the knowledge to recognize when those values are being tested, the final step is to Apply the Values at the Testing Point. Our value that perhaps challenges us the most is morality. A simple definition of morality is "knowing the difference between right and wrong...and then choosing to do what is right." A courageous leader first looks within himself and makes a commitment to do what is right no matter the circumstances. Then, in the heat of the moment, he considers his responsibilities, his oath as a Phi Gam, and the consequences of each choice.

An essential skill in responding at the testing point is the ability to confront in a productive manner. Our effort to Build Courageous Leaders will give brothers the skills to confront, with an end in mind that really is best for all parties.

These elements of courageous leadership -- understanding our values, recognizing testing points, and applying the values at the testing point -- will be built into many of the Fraternity's existing programs, including the Fiji Academy, Taking the Lead programming, risk management education, alcohol education, hazing prevention, sexual misconduct prevention, and even chapter discipline. As appropriate and needed, they will form the basis of new programs.

Building Courageous Leaders is good for our brothers and good for our chapters. If brothers learn to Lead with Courage, they will be better prepared for many of the difficult decisions they will face in their lives. It is one of the most valuable lessons that Phi Gamma Delta can teach them and will secure their role in the upward march of humanity.

Building Courageous Leaders means that our members will understand and embrace Phi Gamma Delta's values; will recognize when those values are being challenged and understand the implications of a particular choice; and at that testing point, will know how to confront and lead others in a productive way.

INSTITUTE DONOR SUPPORTS EDUCATION

When **John Pappajohn** began kindergarten in Mason City, Iowa, his mother – a young Greek immigrant – started school, too. Maria Pappajohn did so to learn the language of a new country, and her inspiring example taught John a lifelong lesson about the value of education.

That's why the 1952 University of Iowa graduate, a highly successful venture capitalist and philanthropist, has stayed connected to his alma mater and Phi Gamma Delta through generous gifts of time and resources. He made his first donation of \$10 to the Fraternity in 1966 and has been giving back to Phi Gamma Delta and his university ever since.

In addition to his gift to fund the first year of the Leadership Institute, John has created scholarships at the Phi Gamma Delta Educational Foundation for students in need, an entrepreneurial scholarship and a scholarship for his Mu Deuteron Chapter.

John began managing his family's grocery store in Mason City, Iowa, after his father died when he was just 16. He and his two brothers, also Phi Gams, took turns working at the store and attending school. John eventually earned a bachelor's degree in commerce from UI.

He went on to found Equity Dynamics, Inc., a financial-consulting entity, and Pappajohn Capital Resources, a venture-capital firm, in 1969. He has helped finance more than 100 business start-ups and has served on the board of directors for more than 40 public companies. Such business acumen earned John a place in the Iowa Business Hall of Fame in 1996, after also receiving the Horatio Alger Award in 1995.

John is a member of the University of Iowa Foundation Board of Directors, and he and his wife, Mary, have served on numerous UI and UI Foundation volunteer and campaign committees. They also are members of the President's Club, which recognizes the University of Iowa's most generous contributors. Their many visionary UI contributions include naming gifts for the Pappajohn Business Building, the John and Mary Pappajohn Clinical Cancer Center, the John Pappajohn Entrepreneurial Center, and the Pappajohn Biomedical Institute in the John and Mary Pappajohn Biomedical Discovery Building.

John also holds four honorary degrees: Honorary Doctorates of Humane Letters from Iowa State University in 2007, Grand View College in 2008, the University of Iowa in 2010, and Drake University in 2011.

This impressive legacy of success and selflessness is rooted in his mother's early lessons about the importance of education and altruism. As John has said, "Those of us who are lucky enough to be successful and make money owe it to society to give back something."

JERRY L. ANDERSON (KANSAS 1981) has been named Dean of Drake University Law School, effective July 1, 2016. Currently the Richard M. and Anita Calkins Distinguished Professor of Law, he joined the Drake faculty as a professor of law in 1991, and from 1996-2001 he served as Associate Dean. He has twice been named the Leland Forrest Outstanding Professor of the Year. Prior to joining Drake Law School, Jerry taught at the Catholic University of America Columbus Law School and at the University of Oklahoma Law School. Brother Anderson earned his B.S. in Business Administration at Kansas and his J.D. from Stanford Law School. Early in his career he practiced law at Lathrop & Norquist in Kansas City, Missouri, and clerked in the U.S. Court of Appeals, 9th Circuit. He has co-authored two books on property and environmental law.

CHRISTOPHER S. CISSELL (WILLIAM JEWELL 1994) was inducted into William Jewell College's Athletic Hall of Fame in October. Brother Cissell coached soccer for 12 years at William Jewell, coaching the women's team all 12 years and the men's team for nine years. With a combined record of 282-106-22, he was named Conference Coach of the Year seven times and Midwest Region Coach of the Year four times. His teams won eight conference titles and had nine national tournament appearances and three trips to the final four. Since 2011 Chris has been the women's soccer coach at the University of Missouri Kansas City, compiling a record of 53-37-13.

JAMES L. CUNNINGHAM (OKLAHOMA 1958) was awarded the prestigious Frederick S. Lane Award at the annual meeting of the American College of Real Estate Lawyers (ACREL) in October. The award honors the career contributions of distinguished real estate lawyers who have selflessly

served their community, the College and the profession. It is the highest honor the College can bestow and has been awarded only eight times since 1978. Brother Cunningham was commissioned in the U.S. Army in 1958, leaving active duty in 1962 to attend law school at the University of Oklahoma College of Law. Upon graduation in 1964 he joined the Denver, CO, law firm Dawson, Nagel, Sherman & Howard, where he specialized in complex real estate development, loans and transactions. He retired from the firm in 2004. He also served as president of ACREL and chair of the Anglo-American Real Property Institute and was a member of the American Bar Association/American Law Institute (ALI/ABA) for 30 years. Named one of the "Best Lawyers in America" for more than 20 years, he was a two-term member of the Board of Governors of the Colorado Bar Association.

BOBBY M. GLEASON (TEXAS TECH 1972) will retire as Texas Tech's Senior Associate Athletics Director on June 30, 2016. Brother Gleason joined Texas Tech's athletic department in 1994 as Assistant Athletics Director for Business Operations and in 1995 was promoted to Associate Athletics Director. As manager of the financial affairs of the athletic department, Bobby helped grow the budget from \$9 million in 1994 to \$77 million in the 2015-16 fiscal year, and he oversaw the investment of \$300 million in athletic facilities. Prior to joining the Athletic Department, he was Director of Business Affairs for the Texas Tech Research Foundation. Bobby serves on the Lambda Tau Chapter BCA as scholarship advisor.

MANUEL G. "MANNY" GONZALEZ (CALIFORNIA BERKELEY 1977) was inducted into the prestigious College of Fellows by the American Institute of Architects' 2016 Jury

Raj serves on the board of trustees of Kettering University.

SCOTT A. STRICKLIN (MISSISSIPPI STATE 1992) was selected to receive the Under Armour Athletics Director of the Year Award for 2016. He has been Director of Athletics at Mississippi State since May 2010, overseeing an investment of over \$130 million in facilities during that time. He returned to Mississippi State in 2008 as Senior Associate Athletics Director for External Affairs and moved from that position to Director of Athletics.

SHAFIN D. TEJANI (WESTERN ONTARIO 1998) was named the 2015 Ernst & Young Entrepreneur of the Year for Technology at the 22nd annual EY Entrepreneur of the Year Awards held in Vancouver and Toronto, CA. The EY Entrepreneur of the Year is the world's most prestigious business award for entrepreneurs. He also received a Special Citation for Advancing Entrepreneurship. Brother Tejani is the founder and CEO of Victory Square Labs (VSL), which he started in 2007. The company's mission is to build other companies by giving them access to space, resources and network. Since its founding, VSL has helped start 41 companies in 21 different countries.

DAVID E. WATERS (KANSAS STATE 1999) received the Young Alumni Award from the College of Arts & Sciences at Kansas State University on October 15. After graduating with a bachelor's degree in Spanish and political science, David earned his law degree from the University of Kansas School of Law. He is an attorney and partner at Lathrop & Gage, LLP in Kansas City, MO. He was named to the Missouri/Kansas Super Lawyers "Rising Stars" for 2012-14 and The Best Lawyers in America for Real Estate for 2013-2016. His community involvement includes service on both the Planning Commission and the Board of Zoning Appeals for the City of Westwood, KS, and the Board of Directors of the Northeast Johnson County Chamber of Commerce. He has served his Chi Deuteron Chapter as Purple Legionnaire and BCA Chairman. In 1999 David received the Wilkinson Award as Phi Gamma Delta's outstanding senior.

N. W. "JERRY" SOLOMON (NEBRASKA 1951) has long been a booster of University of Nebraska athletics, attending hundreds of Husker basketball and football games over the years. Now he is a major donor to the University of Nebraska's National Athletic Performance Laboratory (NAPL), a world-leading research and education center designed to enhance the performance, safety, health and well-being of student-athletes. To recognize this support, the University named the new basketball court at the NAPL in honor of Jerry and his wife, Barbara. Pictured at right at the ribbon cutting ceremony on October 24 are Jerry's son Steve (Nebraska 1980), daughter Cinda, Athletic Director Shawn Eichorst, Jerry, and Barbara.

Through the laboratory, researchers in areas such as biomechanics, computer science, endocrinology, engineering, ergonomics, exercise physiology, nutrition, physical rehabilitation, psychology, sports science and vision collaborate with NU coaches and staff with the aim of helping athletes achieve optimum performance while reducing risk of injuries. While Jerry believes the program can be a competitive advantage for NU athletics, he also says, "Hopefully all schools will follow suit."



In addition to Cornhusker sports and family, another passion of Jerry's has been Phi Gamma Delta. He has served the Fraternity as a Field Secretary, Section Chief, House Corporation President (Nebraska), Trustee and Archon (1970-76). 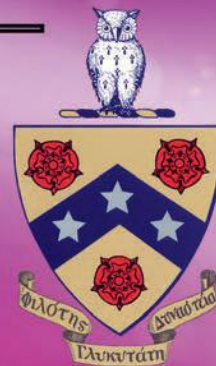

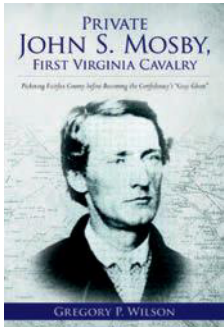

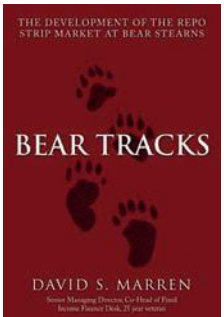
PRIVATE JOHN S. MOSBY, FIRST VIRGINIA CAVALRY

By George P. Wilson (Ohio Wesleyan 1974) - History/Biography - Published by CreateSpace Independent Publishing Platform - 2015

Subtitled "Picketing Fairfax County before Becoming the Confederacy's Gray Ghost," Brother Wilson's second Civil War biography looks in depth at the early life of one of the most elusive Confederate spies of the time, John S. Mosby.

But before his days as a rebel spy, Mosby began his military career as a picket for the Confederate army. This book takes a closer look at this time in his life, on which little has been written. Brother Wilson's interest in Mosby began while writing his first Civil War biography, about his grandfather (Jonathan Roberts: The Civil War's Quaker Scout & Sheriff, published in 2014), in whose life Mosby plays a minor, but pivotal role.

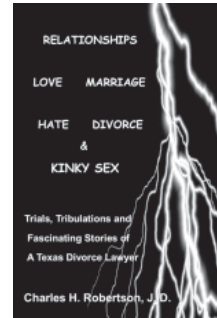
BEAR TRACKS

By David S. Marren (Bucknell 1983) - Autobiography/Financial - Published by CreateSpace Independent Publishing Platform - 2015

David Marren was co-head of the Bear Stearns fixed income finance desk from 1995 until the firm was taken over by JP Morgan in 2008. His book, subtitled "The Development of the Repo Strip Market at Bear Stearns," provides a unique glimpse into the inner workings of the STRIPS

segment of the financial industry. (STRIPS stands for "separate trading of interest and principal securities.") Using his personal life and experiences as a keyhole to the world of Wall Street, David offers a detailed account of his time before, during, and after his 25 years at Bear Stearns.

David graduated from Bucknell University in 1983 and later earned a MBA from Pace University. In the summer of 2007, he was diagnosed with Primary Lateral Sclerosis (PLS), a rare neuromuscular disease similar to ALS. His goal in writing Bear Tracks is to help bring awareness and raise funds for the research of PLS and, hopefully, find a cure. He and his wife of 27 years, Caroline, reside in Darien, CT, and have four children.

We are thrilled to announce the first Leadership Institute: Building Courageous Leaders. This five day premier leadership experience will empower brothers to work to resolve real issues and challenges facing their chapters that are incongruent with the values of Phi Gamma Delta.

START UP FUNDING

We are also pleased to announce that **John Pappajohn (Iowa 1952)** and his wife, Mary, have generously funded the first year costs of the Institute. Their gift will allow all brothers to attend without cost to them. Their gift to the Phi Gamma Delta Educational Foundation allows the Fraternity to focus their energy on creating the best learning environment for the Institute. The Pappajohn's have been generous to Phi Gamma Delta over the years, funding several scholarships. In addition, **Robert C. Pohlad (Arizona State 1976)** funded the cost to develop the curriculum for the Institute. Bob has been instrumental in funding the Fraternity's leadership programs for years. For additional Institute introduction, turn to page 43.

GRANTS ISSUED

We continue to lead all fraternities in scholarships awarded with 1,201 scholarships totaling \$376,935 last fiscal year! Of these, 940 were Academic Achievement Awards totaling \$235,000. We also awarded 261 chapter restricted scholarships totaling \$141,930.

The Foundation granted \$178,000 to the Fraternity for its scholastic, leadership, alcohol education, and philanthropic programs, which are provided and available to all chapters and colonies.

Grants to house corporations for construction of qualifying educational space, renovations or maintenance totaled \$753,880. These grants are funded by generous brothers for such specific projects and do not come from the Foundation's general funds.

ANNUAL FUND

Gifts to the Foundation for calendar year 2015 for all funds totaled \$2,641,000 from 2,643 donors.

The Annual Fund benefited from 2,264 donors who gave \$685,127 in unrestricted gifts. These gifts are used by the Foundation to fund a portion of everything we do: from managing an office, employing staff, grants to the Fraternity and scholarships, stewardship and fund raising.

400 Brothers gave \$500 or more to the Perge! Society Annual Fund. They are recognized at four levels on page 59 for their unrestricted

gifts.

ENDOWMENT

We also use endowment income/appreciation as directed by the donor to fund scholarships, leadership programming, alcohol education and general operations of the Foundation. The Foundation's principal assets were \$8,549,000 at the end 2015. Current income from these investments combined with annual fund donations was sufficient to meet current program expenses. Additional assets of \$9,407,000 are restricted for chapter scholarships and qualifying chapter building projects.

The endowment funds are invested by a professional manager under the oversight of an investment committee made up of board members and volunteer brothers experienced in financial management. The return on our investments for the 2015 calendar year was -4.35%.

We are so grateful to brothers who give and thankful to those who plan ahead by including the Foundation in their estate plans. Five brothers significantly impacted the Foundation with estate gifts: **William T. Morris (Penn State 1949)**, **Tony George (Indiana 1949)**, **H. Robert Cassling (Iowa State 1952)**, **M. We awarded more scholarships this year than in any prior year. How did we do it? Your generous financial support allowed us to grant 61% of income to brothers and chapters in the form of scholarships, leadership training, alcohol abuse education and housing grants. We continue to keep our administration costs including fund raising and operating the Foundation low at 15% of income; which is an excellent percentage!

We issued 20 - \$500 Academic Achievement Awards (Triple A) to all newly initiated members who earn a 3.0 GPA on a 4.0 scale. We also awarded 42 scholarships of \$1,000 each to deserving undergraduate and graduate brothers. These awards have helped to place an importance on academics in our chapters. Scholarships issued totaled \$52,000!

HAROLD W. ANDERSEN (NEBRASKA 1945) passed ad astra on December 17, 2015. Brother Andersen began a career in journalism as editor of the student newspaper at Nebraska. After graduation, he landed a position as a reporter for the Lincoln Star, where he worked for a year. He went to the Omaha World-Herald in 1946, working in several positions until 1966, when he was named chief executive and publisher. He led the paper for the next 23 years. One of the highlights of his career was a 1974 editorial, which he co-authored, calling for President Richard Nixon's resignation. A national and international leader in the fight for freedom of the press, he headed the World Press Freedom Committee and also served as the first American president of the International Federation of Newspaper Publishers. In service to his alma mater, he and his wife, Marian, co-chaired Campaign Nebraska, which raised over \$727 million for the University. To recognize his service to the University, the College of Journalism and Mass Communications building was dedicated as Harold and Marian Andersen Hall. In 1992 he was honored by Phi Gamma Delta as a Distinguished Fiji.

FRATERNALLY SPEAKING

In this column in the previous issue of the magazine, I addressed the future of the Greek system, opining that the future will be a series of decisions, including a constant evaluation of practices and traditions, strategies and tactics to determine those that are still relevant and useful.

More recently I spoke at a Pig Dinner about the factors that determine the future and durability of an undergraduate chapter. After acknowledging the most obvious and universally accepted factor, graduate involvement, I talked about three others.

The first factor in chapter durability is goodwill, defined in the fraternity context as relationships and reputation that earn a chapter the benefit of the doubt when something goes wrong. Goodwill is like a bank account set aside for tough times. It can be built on three simple attributes:

- Good grades, which start with consistently being above the all-men's and all-fraternity averages. Even better is being in the top 3 or even #1 on campus. Good grades are an objective indication that a chapter is recruiting capable students and providing a good academic environment. The chapter with poor academic performance starts with a negative balance in its goodwill account.
- Service to the campus and community. This includes the fund raising, or "philanthropy," that has become prominent in most campus Greek systems today. An equally, if not more, important element when building goodwill is direct involvement in causes and charities in the local community. It is often said that the general public does not distinguish one fraternity from another. However, a chapter that is doing a great job with service to its own community will be known and viewed as a valuable member of that community.
- A reputation as gentlemen. This is far more than just knowing the rules of etiquette. It means respecting the dignity and well-being of all people in every circumstance. It includes treating other people the way we want those who are most important to us to be treated. The goodwill built through good grades and service to the community is quickly lost through inconsiderate and boorish behavior by even one brother.

The next factor in chapter durability is accountability. It is truly the glue that holds the entire fraternity enterprise together and must be present at every level. Indeed, the demise of the great majority of chapters that have failed can be traced to a lack of accountability to our oath as brothers, whether that was expecting brothers to participate in activities, to recruit new members, to meet financial obligations, or to follow the accepted rules of behavior. Within a chapter, accountability not only assures durability but is essential to true friendship. The concept of friendship in fraternity means that we expect each other to be the best we can be and to live by the highest standards. To accept anything less from a brother is a disservice to him, to the chapter and to our value of friendship.

Finally, as with the future of the Greek system, the durability and health of a chapter will depend on good decision making. This applies in the routine administration of a chapter, such as the selection of officers, goal setting and financial management, where good decisions will make a chapter stronger. But good decision making is even more critical at the testing points that inevitably arise in chapter life, when a bad decision could put the chapter in jeopardy. Here is where the Fraternity's initiative to Build Courageous Leaders becomes so important. Where brothers appreciate the values of Phi Gamma Delta, recognize the testing points when those values are being challenged or forgotten, and respond with courage, the chapter has a formidable firewall against misfortune.
